These matters include construction, energy (conventional and cleantech), gas re-opener/revision, intellectual property, cybersecurity, banking, bankruptcy, tax, and other matters under JVAs, EPCs, GPSAs, PSCs, PPA, JDAs, Offtake agreements, long-term leases, investment laws, and investment treaties. She also serves as presiding, sole, emergency and co-arbitrator in international arbitrations. Christina has acted for States and State-owned entities including Bangladesh, Bulgaria, Djibouti, Croatia, Cyprus, The Gambia, Greece, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Mauritius, Mozambique, Namibia, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Sudan, and the League of Arab States.
